This course introduces students to descriptive statistics (measures of central tendency and variation and representing data graphically), and statistical inference. Inference will involve sampling techniques, estimation, hypothesis testing and simple regression. Applications emphasize continuous improvement of products and services. Prerequisite: Math 175 or Math 141 or Math 191 and Junior standing.

Business and Economic Statistics**6:15 PM - 8:55 PM****BA 578.801****Tuesday**

A course dealing with the study and applications of sampling, estimation, hypothesis testing, analysis of variance, correlation, regression analysis, time series decision theory and nonparametric statistical methods. Prerequisite: BA 302 or equivalent.

Statistical Methods**6:15 PM - 8:55 PM****EDAD 615.81E****Monday**

The introductory course is designed to provide an overview of the organization and administration of the public school system in America with focused attention upon the systemic transformation of the public schools of Texas. The principles of effective leadership and organizational theory will be examined in order to transfer theory into practice.

Leading Effective Schools**5:00 PM - 7:10 PM****EDAD 626.81E****Monday**

An examination of the legal framework for education including the United States constitution, federal and state statutes, and the body of case law affecting school leadership.

Using the Law in Educational Practice**7:20 PM - 9:30 PM**

FIN 312.801**Thursday**

The nature and evaluation of money and its role in determining the overall level of economic activity. The course also examines the role of banking, central banking, and monetary policy as they apply to financial instruments and institutions in the context of global financial markets. Prerequisite Eco 231, 232.

Money, Banking, and Financial Markets**6:15 PM - 8:55 PM****FIN 504.801****Wednesday**

A study of business finance within the economic environment including financial reporting, analysis, markets and regulations, with emphasis on global and ethical issues. Risk, valuation, planning and analysis including working capital management and capital budgeting, and other decision rules help maximize the value of the firm. Focus on total quality management and financial considerations in the production of goods and services. Prerequisites: Fin 304 or Fin 501, or consent of instructor.

Financial Management**6:15 PM - 8:55 PM****FIN 510.801****Thursday**

A comprehensive study of security selection and analysis techniques and of security markets and how they are affected by the domestic and international economic, political, and tax structures. Prerequisites: Fin 504 or consent of instructor.

Investment Seminar**6:15 PM - 8:55 PM****HIED 595.801****Wednesday**

This course provides a study of research methodologies with appropriate practical application in relevant problem solving. Specific research types, including action research will be emphasized. Note: The student is required to demonstrate his or her competence in the investigation and formal reporting of a problem.

Research Methodologies**5:00 PM - 7:40 PM****HIED 653.801****Tuesday**

Introduces prominent theories of administrative thought, including the theories of change, communication, role, and evaluation of personnel. Practical applications of these theories will be studied; leadership strategies for the dean, division chair, and chair will be emphasized.

Fundamental Theories in Community College Instructional Leadership**5:00 PM - 7:40 PM****MGT 307.801****Tuesday**

This course is an introduction to the concepts, principles, problems, and practices of operations management. Emphasis is on managerial processes for effective operations in both goods-producing and service-rendering organizations. Topics include operations strategy, process design, capacity planning, facilities location and design, forecasting, production scheduling, inventory control, quality assurance, and project management. The topics are integrated using a systems model of the operations of an organization. Prerequisite Junior standing, Math 141 or 175, BA 302, MIS 128 or IT 111.

Operations Management**6:15 PM - 8:55 PM****MGT 527.801****Wednesday**

A study of administrative processes and policy determination at the general management level through the use of case analysis. Note Course open to business majors only. Should be taken during semester of graduation.

Strategic Management**6:15 PM - 8:55 PM****MGT 585.801****Monday**

This course provides an in-depth seminar emphasizing the development of the skills and knowledge required for successful managerial performance. It focuses on such areas as developing self awareness, creative problem solving, supportive communication, the use of power and influence, motivation techniques and managing conflict.

Management Skills Development**6:15 PM - 8:55 PM****MGT 592.81E****Tuesday**

This course provides an analysis of current human resource management issues emphasizing their impact on an organization's success.

Current Issues in Human Resource Management**6:15 PM - 8:55 PM****MIS 426.801****Wednesday**

This course provides students with the understanding of managerial and organization needs to analyze, design, and implement an information system. The role of information services in management, including current professional practices and methodologies, will be covered along with the presentation of systems theory, decision theory, organizational models, types of information systems, information planning, and information systems development. Prerequisites: Senior Standing.

Management Information Systems**6:15 PM - 8:55 PM****MKT 521.81E****Thursday**

A comprehensive study of the effective application of marketing strategies in international and domestic organizations. A case analysis approach and current professional literature are utilized. Prerequisites Mkt 306.

Marketing Management**6:15 PM - 8:55 PM****PHO 341.801****Friday**

Emphasis on technical quality and the methods and techniques of commercial and advertising photography. The student will learn creative control of studio lighting and equipment, and will develop a capacity to generate and refine ideas. Prerequisite Photography 209 and 210.

Advertising and Commercial Photography**1:00 PM - 4:50 PM****PHO 350.801****Thursday**

A continuation of Photography 250, this course places increased emphasis on the computer as a tool for the enhancement of photographic imagery or illustration. Prerequisite Pho 250.

Advanced Digital Photography**6:00 PM - 10:00 PM**

PHO 379.001**Tuesday**

An examination of the scientific and aesthetic history of photography from its origins to the present. Emphasis is placed on early processes, the pioneers of photography, photography as a visual art and developments in modern photography. Media, trends, and the work of photographers are analyzed. *Cross-listed with ARTH 597.801*

Survey of Photographic History**6:00 PM - 8:50 PM****PSY 500.8EX****Thursday**

A course designed for teacher education students to provide a thorough understanding of the dynamic relationship between cognition, learning, and development for school aged children and adolescents. Formative and summative assessment and evaluation procedures will also be presented. Note: This course is required as a part of the initial certification program in teacher education.

Cognition, Learning & Development**7:20 PM - 10:00 PM****SED 514.8EX****Thursday**

Contains the professional body of knowledge necessary for effective teaching. This course emphasizes methods of organizing and managing a classroom based on an understanding of diverse environments. Teacher skills which have been proven to be effective in supporting diversity in the classroom will be developed. The content of this course will include classroom management strategies, curriculum and lesson planning, teaching models, assessment models, and certification issues. Students will exhibit an understanding of the Texas teacher competencies as outlined on the Professional Development portion of the TExES test. Note: This course is required as a part of the initial certification program in teacher education.

Management & Curriculum Development for Diverse Learners**4:30 PM - 7:10 PM****University of North Texas****ACCT 4900.730****Thursday**

Focuses on tax problems relative to the oil and gas industry. Students registering for ACCT 4900.730 will need to contact Becky Andrews at 940-565-3082 for a class permission code. (*meets with ACCT 5340.030*)

Special Problems**6:30 PM - 9:20 PM****ACCT 5340.030****Thursday**

Focuses on tax problems relative to the oil and gas industry. Topics may include acquisition, operation and disposition of natural resource properties; preproduction expenditures, depletion, depreciation and ad valorem taxes; tax planning for natural resource investments; or other topics. Prerequisite(s): ACCT 5300 (4300). (*meets with ACCT 4900.730*)

Oil and Gas Taxation**6:30 PM - 9:20 PM****ADES 5510.090****Monday**

In this studio-based course, students will explore a variety of visual techniques and processes for ideation, innovative thinking and planning from which to create a common language across disciplinary backgrounds. This knowledge will allow them to develop innovative visual solutions in the future.

Methods for Innovation**6:30 PM - 9:20 PM****ADES 5520.090****Tuesday**

In this studio-based course, students will explore a variety of visual techniques and processes for ideation, innovative thinking and planning from which to create a common language across disciplinary backgrounds. This knowledge will allow them to develop innovative visual solutions in the future.

Design Research I**6:30 PM - 9:20 PM****CJUS 3630D****Tuesday**

Examines the relationship between drugs, crime and human behavior. Explores the relationship between drug abuse and crime and the policy proposals developed to control drug trafficking, drug abuse, and drug-related crime, as well as the multi-faceted aspects and effects of chemical abuse and dependency. (Same as SOCI 3630.)

Drugs, Crime & Society**6:00 PM - 8:50 PM****HSML 3000D.098****Thursday**

The foundation course for students interested in a career in one of the human service professions. Examination of the philosophy, values, roles and responsibilities of human services and human service workers in today's society. Examination of personal needs, interests, and potential strengths as a professional human service worker.

Human Service in the Nonprofit Sector**5:30 PM - 8:20 PM****JOUR 4051.001****Thursday**

Concepting, writing and executing ads and campaigns in a variety of media. Ads are critiqued from concept to final execution. Application required to be admitted to the class. Prerequisite(s): Journalism major or minor status, JOUR 4050 and consent of school. Offered fall term/semester only.

Advanced Advertising Copywriting**6:30 PM - 9:20 PM****JOUR 5100.002****Wednesday**

Study of public relations trends and principles and how they relate to cases involving organizations and institutions in the profit and non-profit sectors. Attention to the use of proper public relations tools in meeting the needs of each organization's public.

Case Problems in Public Relations**6:30 PM - 9:20 PM**

JOUR 5270.002**Monday**

Equips current and future journalists with the skills to do responsible reporting that includes getting information that is often difficult to obtain from government and private sources. This hands-on advanced reporting class focuses on "sunshine laws" and other freedom of information laws that are helpful in obtaining information legally available to the public; mining online databases of public records that pertain to stories journalists pursue for the public's need to know about the institutions, public figures and other entities that affect our daily lives. Prerequisite(s): consent of department.

Advanced Reporting Techniques**6:30 PM - 9:20 PM****MGMT 3720D.091****Tuesday/Thursday**

Individual behavior in formal organizations. Cases, lectures and experiential exercises in organizational culture, motivation, leadership, dynamics of power, perception and attribution, communication, decision making and performance, and individual differences.

Organizational Behavior**4:00 PM - 5:20 PM****MUAG 5900.711****Monday**

The course will explore optimal techniques for recording in the 21st century, including sound production, technical accuracy, intonation, and musical phrasing. The course will utilize classroom technical resources to support instructional goals.

Practicum in Recording Techniques**6:00 PM - 9:00 PM****University of North Texas/DISD Cohort****EDAD 5610D.050****Monday**

Every administrator in an educational organization has a responsibility to engage in public relations on a daily basis. The primary objective of this course is to examine school-based public relations with the context of life in an information age, practice in schools shared decision-making, and sustained demands for school improvement. Students study three critical dimensions of school public relations: informing the public; modifying attitudes and opinions; integrating the actions and attitudes of an organization with those of its public. Prerequisite(s): completion of EDAD 5300, 5390 and 5400.

School Communications and Public Relations**5:30 PM - 8:20 PM****EDAD 5620D.050****Tuesday**

Course designed to investigate the values, theoretical bases, best practices, and challenges for leaders who administer student educational services at the school or district levels. Provides a review of federal laws, rules, regulations, and expectations for students placed at risk in educational settings by circumstances and situations beyond their control. Emphasis on students who are educationally disadvantaged because of poverty, language differences, disabilities, interests, and academic performance or lack thereof. Prerequisite(s): completion of EDAD 5300, 5330 and 5400.

Administration and Leadership for Student Educational Services**5:30 PM - 8:20 PM****University of Texas at Arlington****HCAD 5310.001****Monday/Wednesday (8/30 - 10/13)**

Coverage of statutory and case law of the health care industry. Topics include patient rights and malpractice, employment and compensation matters, insurance and claims, and government agencies that regulate aspects of health services delivery.

Health Care Law**6:00 PM - 9:20 PM****HCAD 5390.001****Monday/Wednesday (8/30 - 10/13)**

Development of skills necessary for managing health care organizations from a strategic perspective. Particular emphasis is given to the use of systematic assessment of the environment and the organization, as well as the development and implementation of business strategies to meet the needs of stakeholders. Must be taken in last semester of with permission of the Graduate Advisor.

Strategic Management for Health Care Organizations**6:00 PM - 9:20 PM****HCAD 5392.001****TBA**

In-depth study of selected topics in health care administration.

Special Topics in Health Care Administration**TBA****HCAD 5399.001****TBA**

Practicum in health care administration and application of concepts and theories to administrative situations in the health industry.

Internship/Research Project**TBA****INSY 5350.001****Monday/Wednesday (8/30 - 10/13)**

Addresses issues in the development, integration, and management of health care information systems. Specifically, topics in financial information systems, patient care systems, and health care delivery applications will be discussed. Both case studies and real life applications will be studied.

Health Care Information Systems**6:00 PM - 9:20 PM****MANA 5334.001****Tuesday/Weds. (9/1 - 11/18)**

Explores internal and external consulting to business organizations. Emphasis on the management of the change process through the stages of data gathering, diagnosis, analysis, and recommendation. (Tuesdays first seven weeks, then will meet on Wednesdays)

Organizational Consulting & Research**6:00 PM - 9:20 PM****REAE 5317.001****Monday/Wednesday (8/30 - 10/4)**

Topics relating to construction management for commercial investment real estate.

Construction Management**6:00 PM - 9:50 PM**

REAE 5319.001**Monday/Wednesday (10/6 - 11/8)**

Study of real property financing methods; analysis of cost of borrowing, sources of funds, and mortgage terms; emphasis on construction and permanent financing of commercial and industrial properties. Prerequisite: FINA 5311 or REAE 5311.

Seminar in Real Estate Finance**6:00 PM - 9:50 PM****REAE 5321.001****Monday/Wednesday (11/10 - 12/13)**

Introduction to analytical techniques, sources of financing, and other factors related to real estate investment. Stresses current developments and topics. Prerequisite: FINA 5311 or REAE 5311.

Seminar in Real Estate Investment**6:00 PM - 9:50 PM****University of Texas at Arlington/UCEL Cohort****EDAD 5381.003****Tuesday (8/31 - 12/7)**

Focus on the legal foundation of public education, political theory, and application of political skills in working with school personnel, students, parents, and community organizations. The role of the law, court rulings, and the politics of school governance at the federal, state, and local levels will be addressed.

Political and Legal Aspects of Education**5:00 PM - 7:50 PM****EDAD 5389.003****Tuesday (8/31 - 12/7)**

Designed to provide prospective educational administrators job-related experiences under supervision in an appropriate educational setting. An approved professional study is designed in relationship to the intern's interest and past experiences. Can be repeated for credit with approval of advisor.
